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How Do We Raise Successful Children?

I have had the opportunity twice in the past six months to spend some time with Madeline Levine, the New York Times bestselling author and co-founder of Challenge Success, a project born at Stanford's School of Education. Madeline's two most recent books are *Teach Your Children Well* and *The Price of Privilege*. During both presentations, I had an opportunity to spend some one-on-one time with Madeline. As a camp director, and more importantly as a new parent, I wanted to learn more about her beliefs and values in raising children. I could fill many pages with stories about our conversations and her views on raising successful children, but I want to focus on her answer to a question at the end of one of her presentations. Someone asked, "What are the top two things we can do as parents to raise successful children?" Madeline took some time to really contemplate the question. This is the million dollar question. I am sure she was thinking, "How do you define success?" or "How do I reduce my years of experience to two suggestions?" or "How can I answer this for another parent with different children and a different parenting style?" Madeline and her husband are the proud parents of "three newly minted and thriving adult sons" so she has some personal experience on raising children (to go along with her M.A. and Ph.D in psychology).



Her first suggestion was to "See your child accurately." She showed a picture of her three sons and talked about the differences in each child. Each child demanded different communication, different discipline, and different love. Each child required connection in a different manner. She reminded the

group that each child gives us an opportunity to see the world through a different set of eyes. As the father of three boys, I have this dream of heading out to the golf course or the ski slopes with all three boys each Saturday. Unfortunately, golf and skiing may not be their chosen hobbies. I may be heading to the art museum or the zoo or to listen to a live band performance. Even at a young age, I can tell my three sons are going to have their own interests. Madeline's comment opened my eyes to the idea that my boys are probably going to introduce me to some new interests.

Her second comment was "We don't get to know our children by racing around town." She used the term "invite a listening presence" with our children. This is easier said than done. After a full day of work, an hour of driving around town, and a busy dinner, we don't have much time for a listening presence. I am sure most of our parents live the same schedule. Brooke shared last weekend that a friend of hers had 15 games during the weekend between her three children. How do we manage all of this and find time to really connect?

Two weekends ago, I was lucky enough to take Jackson to the driving range while the other two boys were taking a nap. We hit balls, shared

a lemonade, and then played a few holes on a par 3 course. It was wonderful to have some one-on-one time. (Just because he may open my eyes to new interests doesn't mean I can't try and brainwash him that golf is the best way to spend a Sunday afternoon). The best part of the day came when Erika called to ask us to come home and Jackson didn't want to leave. Now the challenge is consistently finding time to do this with all three boys. Almost every parent you talk to with older children comments on how fast children grow up. After the presentation, Erika and I talked about a goal of finding some quality one-on-one time with each child. We do our best to have dinner each night as a family, but I can see how that even becomes challenging as they grow up. Hopefully each of you are finding time to practice a listening presence. To the children and young adults out there, make time to connect with your parents as well.

As a new parent, I feel like I am learning every day how to effectively raise productive, well-adjusted children. I have a lot more to learn and I thank Madeline for sharing her ideas. 


CILT Update


