The action-packed week ends with a banquet and recognition ceremony. Many of the campers have had to step up and help run their household while one of their parents was deployed or away at training. Cheley is proud to be a part of this impactful program and serve this deserving population. We look forward to many more engaging summers with the Teen Summer Camp.
